Course Outcomes (COs): After completion of the course, the students will be able to:

• Learn the major historical developments pertaining to the Establishment, Expansion and Consolidation of the British Rule in India; different Tools/Methods used for it by the British and their Policy towards Indian States upto 1857.

• Understand the major historical developments pertaining to the Uprising of 1857, Beginning of the Crown's Rule, Impact of Social Reform Movements like Brahmo Samaj, Arya Samaj and Satyashodhak Samaj; Political Reforms of 1909, 1919 and 1935 and the rise of Depressed Class Movement in India.

• Grasp the major historical developments related to the Beginning of Indian National Movement, role of Revolutionaries in National Movement, role of Mahatma Gandhi in National Movement, Subhash Chandra Bose and INA and the circumstances leading to the Partition and Independence of India.

• Demonstrate the Expansion of the British Empire upto 1856, Centers of the Uprising of 1857, Centers of Revolutionary Movement and Centers of Gandhian Movement on the outline map of India and also explicate it historically.

Note:
